Boxing Note-Taking Method

Boxing Note-Taking Method

- The practice of using boxes to visually separate topics within a page.
- Allows for students to review their notes in a visual way and identify key topics.
- Best used for visual learners.
- This method is also good for learning languages and verb tenses.

How to use:

- Identify the main topic as well as relevant subtopics.
- The title or main topic should be at the top of the page.
- Under each subtopic, note down key points in the form of a list and frame each subtopic with its relevant information in a box.
- Boxes can be made bigger or smaller depending on the note taker preference.

Boxing Note-Taking Example by Candace Osmond:

A verb tense is made of a time frame and an aspect. The time frame is divided into the past, present, and future. The aspects of verb tenses refer to the verb's state of action, and they are divided into four: simple, progressive, perfect, and present progressive tenses.
