For **citation-sequence**, number the references and order them within the list in the sequence in which they first appear in the text. That means the first reference listed in the end-reference list will be the first in-text reference in your paper. No Hanging Indent.

For **citation-name**, place references in alphabetic order by author, and then number the references in the same sequence. Your in-text reference numbers will be in nonnumeric order. No Hanging Indent.

For **name-year**, list each reference alphabetically by the author's last name. After the author's name(s), list the year of publication. Continue to list them alphabetically. Hanging Indent.
