Chicago Style 17th Edition - Citing Elders and Knowledge Keepers

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- When citing Indigenous Peoples, use respectful spellings communities prefer for self-reference. Refer to https://www.firstvoices.com/languages/ for accurate spellings and pronunciations. Include specific teachings or stories unique to certain groups or seasons.
- Use descriptors like Time-honored knowledge sharing, Oral teaching, Traditional knowledge sharing, Storytelling, Dance, etc. Consult Elders or Knowledge Keepers for preferred citation details, such as Indigenous name, English name, or community affiliation.

Note

Basic Format

Elder/Knowledge Keeper's LastName, FirstName (Elder/Knowledge Keeper), *Nation/Traditional Territory*. "Topic/Subject of Teachings." Brief description of knowledge sharing type with Learner's FirstName LastName. Knowledge Sharing Place, Knowledge Sharing Date.

Examples

- 1. Chipps, Henry (Elder), *Scia'new/Ka:'yu:'k't'h'*, Coast Salish seasonal round and cedar bark harvesting.In-person time-honored knowledge sharing with Robbyn Lanning, SELEKTEŁ (Goldstream), *WSÁNEĆ & lakwanan* Territories. November 18, 2022.
- 2. Parrish, Natasha (Elder), *Kyaanuuslii Haida/English settler*, Indigenous education in Haida Gwaii. In-person traditional knowledge sharing with Robbyn Lanning, WSÁNEĆ Territory. August 11, 2022.
- 3. Parish, Natasha (Knowledge Keeper), *Kyaanuuslii Haida/English settler*, oral teachings on the telephone with Robbyn Lanning. September 30, 2022.

Shortened note

Basic Format

Surname, FirstName (Title), *Territory*, topic/subject. Type of knowledge sharing with Learner's FirstName LastName, Location, Date.

Examples

- 4 Chipps, Henry (*Scia'new/Ka:'yu:'k't'h'*), cedar bark harvesting. In-person knowledge sharing with Robbyn Lanning, SELEKTEŁ, November 18, 2022.
- 5. Parrish, Natasha (*Kyaanuuslii Haida/English settler*), Indigenous education. In-person traditional knowledge sharing with Robbyn Lanning, WSÁNEĆ Territory, August 11, 2022.

Bibliography entry

Basic Format

LastName, FirstName (Elder/Knowledge Keeper). *Nation/Traditional Territory*. "Topic/Subject of Teachings." Brief description of knowledge sharing type. Learner's FirstName LastName, Knowledge Sharing Place, Knowledge Sharing Date.

Examples

Chipps, Henry. *Scia'new/Ka:'yu:'k'th'*. "Coast Salish seasonal round and cedar bark harvesting." Inperson time-honored knowledge sharing with Robbyn Lanning. SELEKTEŁ (Goldstream), *WSÁNEĆ & lakwanan* Territories, November 18, 2022.

Parrish, Natasha. Kyaanuuslii *Haida/English settler*. "Indigenous education in Haida Gwaii." In-person traditional knowledge sharing with Robbyn Lanning. *WSÁNEĆ* Territory, August 11, 2022.
