Chicago Style 17th Edition - Citing Published Interviews

Note

Basic Format

Interviewee Full Name, "Title of Interview," interview by Interviewer Full Name, Publication Title, Month DD, YYYY, URL.

Examples

1. Juan Guaidó, "Venezuela's Juan Guaidó Tells TIME How He Hopes to Win Over the Military and Remove Nicolas Maduro," interview by Ciara Nugent, *Time* (February 1, 2019), <https://time.com/5518443/juan-guaido-interview-venezuela/>.
2. Darcey Steinke, interview by Sam Tanenhaus and Dwight Garner, *New York Times Book Review*, podcast audio, April 22, 2007.

Basic Format

Interviewee Last Name, interview.

Bibliography entry

Basic Format

Interviewee Last Name, First Name. "Title of Interview." Interview by Interviewer Full Name. *Publication Title*, Month DD, YYYY. URL (if applicable).

- Bellour, Raymond. "Alternation, Segmentation, Hypnosis: Interview with Raymond Bellour." Interview by Janet Bergstrom. *Camera Obscura*, Summer 1979.

Chicago Style 17th Edition - Citing Unpublished Interviews

Note

Basic Format

Interviewee's FirstName LastName (identifying information if applicable), brief description of interview type to Interviewer FirstName LastName (or author), InterviewPlace, InterviewDate.

Examples

1. Anastasia Morales, e-mail message to author, July 31, 2010.
2. Andrew Macmillan (principal adviser, Investment Center Division, FAO), in discussion with the author, Seattle, Washington, September 1998.
3. Benjamin Spock, interview by Milton J. E. Senn, November 20, 1974, interview 67A, transcript, Senn Oral History Collection, National Library of Medicine, Bethesda, MD.

Shortened Note

Basic Format

Interviewee Last Name, interview.

Examples

4. Smith, interview.
5. Johnson, interview.

Bibliography Entry

Basic Format

Last Name, First Name. Interview by Interviewer First Name Last Name. Type of Interview.
Location, Date of Interview.

Examples

Doe, Jane. Interview by John Smith. Telephone interview. March 10, 2023.
Johnson, John. Interview by Emily Brown. Email interview. December 5, 2022.
Smith, Mary. Interview. Personal interview. London, UK, January 20, 2024.

- it's unnecessary to include "by Anonymous" if the interviewer's identity is unknown. Instead, you can simply state "Interview" followed by the interview type (personal interview), location, and date.

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Chicago Style 17th Edition - Citing Unattributed Interviews

Note

Basic Format

Description of the Interview, Location (if applicable), Date of Interview.

Examples

10. Interview with health care worker, March 23, 2010.

11. Telephone interview with expert on environmental policy, Washington D.C., March 5, 2023.

Shortened Note

Basic Format

Description of the Interview.

Examples

12. Telephone interview with expert.

13. Company representative interview.

14. Focus group discussion with parents.

Bibliography Entry

Basic Format

Description of the Interview. Location (if applicable), Date of Interview.

Examples

Telephone interview with expert on environmental policy. Washington D.C., March 5, 2023.

Email correspondence with project manager. October 12, 2023.

Focus group discussion with parents. Los Angeles, CA, May 8, 2021.
