Basic Format

Author(s). "*Title of Thesis or Dissertation.*" (PhD diss., Name of University, Year), page number(s) if applicable.

Examples

1. Cynthia Lillian Rutz, "*King Lear and Its Folktale Analogues*" (PhD diss., University of Chicago, 2013), 99–100.
2. Garcia, Maria. "*Understanding Cultural Differences in International Business.*" PhD diss., Harvard University, 2018, 40.
3. Emily Johnson, "*The Effects of Social Media on Mental Health: A Study of Young Adults*" (Master's thesis, University of California, Berkeley, 2020).

Shortened notes

Basic Format

Author(s), "*Title of Thesis or Dissertation,*" page number(s) if applicable.

Examples

3. Rutz, "*King Lear,*" 158.
4. Garcia, "*Understanding Cultural Differences,*" 40.
5. Johnson, "*Effects of Social Media,*" 25.
