

**Flow Note-Taking Method**

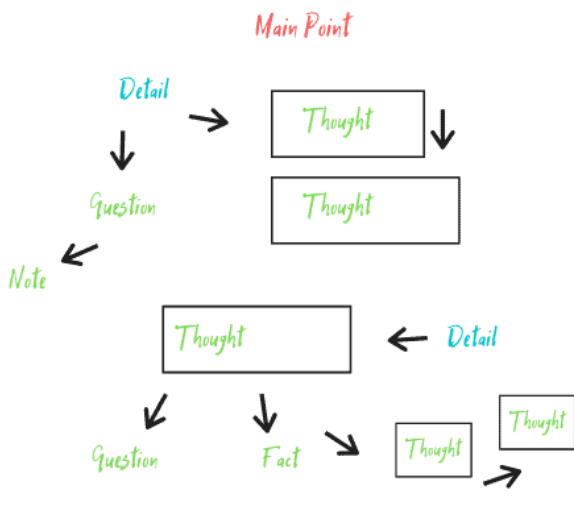
- Best for understanding interrelationships between concepts at a higher level.
- Focus is on higher-level concepts and ideas and how they relate to each other.
- Beneficial when reviewing notes and allows for active engagement with the content.
- Records information by using arrows and lines to connect ideas.

**How to use:**

1. Write the major ideas in just a few words, leaving room for additional notes.
2. Make connections between these ideas while coming up with new ideas to also include in your notes.
3. Draw arrows to interrelated ideas and include pictures or diagrams to help you make stronger connections.
