Literary Analysis

What is a Literary Analysis?

- A literary analysis is an essay that examines, interprets, and evaluates a work of literature. Rather than summarizing, it focuses on analyzing specific elements to uncover deeper meanings, themes, and insights.

Summary: Presents the main points and content without personal opinions or arguments. Discusses the core ideas, main points, and essential details of the original content.	Analysis: Builds an argument by examining and interpreting specific elements. Discusses causes and effects, as well as strengths and weaknesses.
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How to write an Analysis

Choose a Topic

- Choose a theme (a message, claim, or life lesson) that you want to discuss. Answer these questions:
 - What main idea does the author want you to take away?
 - What idea is most relevant to you?
- **Example:** In *Romeo and Juliet* by William Shakespeare, a main theme is forbidden love.

Analyze Key Elements

- Support your main idea by providing evidence from the plot, setting, characters, point of view, figurative language, and style.
- **Plot**
 - Identify the main conflict and key events. How are they ordered, and how do they drive the narrative?
- **Setting**
 - Does the time or location hold significance to the story?
- **Characters**
 - Is there a protagonist and an antagonist? What motivates each character, and how do they evolve?
- **Point of View**
 - What is the point of view? Why does this perspective add/take away from the story?
- **Style**
 - How does the format and word choice (simple, plain, detailed, elevated) impact the overall story?
- **Figurative Language**
 - How are metaphors, similes, imagery, irony, etc., used, and what purposes do they serve?

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Other Elements

- **Theme**
 - What are the central ideas explored in the text?
- **Symbolism**
 - Are there symbols that add depth or meaning to the story?
- **Tone and Mood**
 - What is the author's attitude, and how does it shape the reader's experience?

Connect Ideas

- Now that you've analyzed the key elements, show how they tie back to the author's main theme or purpose.

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Literary Analysis Outline

Introduction

Thesis Statement: *(Introduce the main theme of the work and the focus of your analysis.)*

Body: (Paragraph 1)

Brief Plot Summary: *(Summarize the turning point that directly ties into your analysis.)*

Plot Analysis: *(Analyze how the main theme is conveyed through key events in the story.)*

Body: (Paragraph 2)

Character Analysis *(Focus on how the characters evolve through the story.)*

Body: (Paragraph 3)

Point of View *(Identify the narrative perspective and analyze how it impacts the reader.)*

Body: (Paragraph 4)

Figurative Language *(Analyze metaphors, imagery, etc., and discuss their purpose and effect.)*

Conclusion

Provide a short summary: *(Summarize the main argument in a new way.)*
