Paragraph Formatting RACES Method

How to Format a Paragraph

• When writing an academic paragraph, each sentence should work together to develop your main point clearly and logically. To achieve this, use the Restate, Answer, Cite, Explain, and Summarize (RACES) structure. This method helps you present a well-organized argument supported by evidence, making your ideas more convincing and easier to follow.

• R - Restate

- Rephrase the question or prompt in your own words.
 - Question: "What is the effect of social media on teenage self-esteem?"
 - Example: "The effect of social media on teenage self-esteem is a widely discussed issue today."

• A - Answer

- Directly address the question with your response.
 - Example: "Social media negatively impacts teenagers' self-esteem, mainly due to unrealistic beauty standards."

。 C - Cite

- Support your answer with evidence, such as facts, quotes, or statistics.
 - Example: "According to a 2023 study by the American Psychological Association, 60% of teenagers report feeling inadequate about their appearance after using social media" (APA, 2023).

• E - Explain

- Elaborate on your answer, providing reasoning or clarification.
 - Example: "The pressure to compare oneself to idealized images on platforms like Instagram can lead to insecurity and low self-worth."

• S - Summarize

- Restate your main points to reinforce your argument.
 - Example: "In conclusion, social media's negative impact on self-esteem is significant, and addressing it is crucial."

RACES Paragraph Method

R	(Restate): Restate the question:
A	(Answer): Answer the question in your own words:
C	(Cite): Cite the evidence or examples:
E	(Explain): Explain and give details:
S	(Sum): Summarize it:
